




Overall Performance: Recession and Recovery

Metros Advance, Rural Grows Slowly


Increase in Jobs in the South, 1987-2008


The South and US: 1990 to 2010




A Postsecondary Peek at 2018



2010 Average Unemployment Status by Race, Hispanic or Latino Ethnicity







2008 Election Results by State






